Harmonised Unemployment Rates (HURs) - OECD

The OECD unemployment rate fell by 0.1 percentage point in December 2017, to 5.5%. Outside the euro area, the unemployment rate fell by 0.3 percentage point in Israel (to 4.0%) and by 0.1 percentage point in Canada (to 5.8%), Korea (to 3.6%) and Mexico (to 3.4%). The OECD unemployment rate for youth (people aged 15 to 24) also fell in December, by 0.2 percentage point to 11.6%, 1.0 percentage point below its December 2016 level.

Co-authors of the Choices Magazine article and AAEA members say that "organic production is often more profitable for farmers, but the challenges of learning, implementing, and certifying new production methods can be daunting." Delbridge went on to say, "add to this the discomfort of doing things differently from your neighbors and the fear that profits will shrink if too many farms adopt organic practices, and you can understand why many farmers hesitate to make the change."
