

Nonfatal Child Agricultural Injuries



- Minor injuries
 - Less than 4 hours of inactivity
- Major injuries
 - More than 4 hours of inactivity to life-altering disabilities





- Adult accountability who bears responsibility?
- Cost of injuries medical, rehabilitation
- Emotional toll

Fatal Child Agricultural Injuries



- Fatal injuries
 - Immediate death
 - Delayed death
- Adult accountability
 - Who bears responsibility?
 - Any legal consequences?
- Costs of death
 - Financial
 - Immediate costs
 - Long-term losses
 - Emotional toll






Fatal and Nonfatal Ag Injury Types






Protective Strategies




- Public policy
